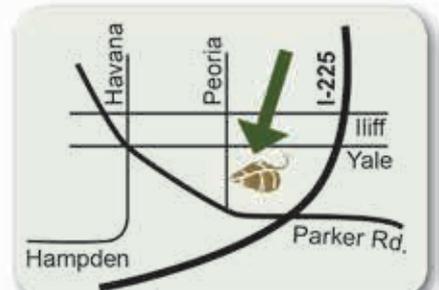

July 31 deadline to run for HGA Board; revised bylaws approved

All directors attended the May 15 meeting of the HGA Board of Directors. Nominating Committee Chair Bill Reynolds reported on the upcoming October election for new board directors, or incumbents running to be re-elected.

Tuesday, July 31 is the deadline for those interested in running to self-nominate. The application form is available in the Management Office. On Aug. 21, those who meet eligibility requirements will be presented to the board as candidates. On Saturday, Sept. 15, 3-5 pm, the Civic Affairs Committee will host a "Meet The Candidates Forum," in Sandberg Auditorium.

The election will be Tuesday, Oct. 2.

"It appears we will have three openings," Reynolds commented.

The board approved changes to its bylaws, moved by Long Range Planning Committee Chair Chuck Montgomerie. Directors had been furnished with copies of the proposed changes prior to the meeting. A number of grammatical changes were made to the bylaws, such as replacing the phrase "email blast" with "electronic mail."

Following the board meeting, a work session was scheduled to consider recommendations from the Area Representatives Organization (ARO). ARO President Diane Dean noted that the meeting might generate more bylaws changes.

"I'm going to present a proposal that might affect the membership of HGA," she reported.

The board approved establishing an ad hoc committee, under the Budget & Finance Committee, to

study and propose strategies for investing HG money. Treasurer John Coil commented that one recommendation of the ad hoc committee might be to establish a permanent investment-advisory subcommittee, at a later date. Retaining a professional financial advisor is another option that is being evaluated.

The board discussed proposed changes for the Procedure Memoranda related to the Architectural Control Committee. Director Forrest McClure questioned if one provision — outlining what residents who install personal security-surveillance cameras are allowed to record — might violate First Amendment rights. The proposal was returned to committee for additional work.

The board approved revised policy on smoking within HG. See page 10.

A handful of residents thanked the board for passing the new policy. One resident did not, saying the policy was based on politics, not science.

(Subsequent to this vote, the Management Office reported that President Kay Sawyer had not signed the policy, because HGA's attorney had suggested additional "minor" changes. Another vote might be forthcoming.)

The board approved an annual membership in the CAI (Community Associations. Institute) for all board directors (\$295).

The board also approved:

...a contract with four vendors, to replace fire-departments connections at 11 HG buildings (\$180,000). The work includes asbestos abatement, where needed.

...a contract with Ideal Restoration to recoat the roof of B241 (\$55,600).

...a contract with Custom Contract Elevator Solutions to replace elevator jacks in B203, B204 and B232 (\$111,500).

...a motion to increase the chair-rail-project budget by \$25,000, to incorporate LED lighting into the renovations in B211.

...changes to the scope of work and increase budget by \$3,000, for recirculation lines in B213, including asbestos abatement as tiles are removed in laundry room.



Left: Arapahoe County has installed an Election Ballot Drop-Off Box near the Tennis Courts at the Clubhouse. Residents will be able to use this box to drop off their ballots for local, state and national elections in the fall. Yet to be installed is a camera to monitor activity at the box. Located on the service road to Rendezvous Restaurant, it cannot be accessed by a driver in a car. You will have to park, then walk to the box to insert your ballot. However, it does save you the postage for mailing your ballot, which, in the past, has cost as much as \$1.76. There will be no temporary box in the Clubhouse Lobby, as has been available in past elections.

HGMD Treasurer's report

Presented at May 2018 HGMD Board Meeting

Highlights of HGMD operations for the year to date through April 2018.

Enterprise Fund

Through April, Enterprise Fund revenue is \$750,767, which is about \$57,700 more than expected. Expenses have been \$685,497, which is about \$116,900 less than expected.

Restaurant income, trip and events income and class income have been more than expected. Clubhouse expenses have been less than expected.

Golf expenses are more than expected due to the timing of aerifying greens on the Golf Course and window cleaning. These were budgeted for later in the year.

Restaurant expenses are more than expected. As restaurant sales go up, the cost of goods sold, labor, and other operating expenses rise.

Capital outlay, due to timing of authorized purchases,

are substantially less than expected. As the year progresses, the capital items will be acquired.

Restricted Funds

Conservation Trust Fund (Lottery). There was no activity in this fund during the month of April. At the end of April, the Lottery bank account had a balance of \$98,034.

Foundation Fund has received donations of \$1,530 through April and \$10,332 has been spent so far this year, including removal of dead trees from the Golf Course during the month. At the end of April, the Foundation Bank account had a balance of \$192,572.

The **Debt Service Fund** has received \$231,980 in property taxes and \$13,121 of Specific Ownership tax through April. At the end of April, the Debt Service bank account had a balance of \$537,933. An interest payment on the outstanding bonds in the amount of \$161,576 will be due on June 1. A principal payment of \$20,000 and an interest payment of \$159,800 will be due on Dec. 1. There are sufficient funds currently available to meet the year's obligation.

Tornado season is here!

Tornado season is mid-May to mid-July, with June being the most active month. (Two-thirds of tornadoes occur then.) Denver is not in "tornado alley" like Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, but tornadoes *do* strike Colorado and the Denver metro area.

Colorado is ranked in the top 10 for tornadoes in U.S. by the National Weather Service (NWS) with Weld County being No. 1 in the nation in number of tornados spawned. From high to low, the states with the most tornadoes (2016) were: Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, Florida, Nebraska, Illinois, Colorado, Iowa, Alabama, Missouri, and Mississippi.

In the past 10 years, more than 500 tornadoes were reported in Colorado, with an average of 60 per year. The record year in Colorado was 1996, when 98 twisters were reported.

The worst tornado in Denver occurred on June 15, 1988. This most destructive tornado struck parts of south Denver, causing extensive damage in three different areas: near Broadway and Evans. In all, 85 buildings were damaged with a total loss estimated to be \$5–10 million dollars. The tornado was rated F3.

The story, by Channel 4, CBS Denver noted,

"While no one was seriously hurt, there were incredible stories of survival, including a golfer who was thrown 40 feet and a woman who was sucked through a convenience store window while holding a baby.

"A man reportedly survived the storm by clinging onto a telephone pole, the winds so strong he lost both of his shoes, a sock and the buttons off his shirt.

"At one point, a dog tethered to the ground by a leash was said to have been suspended in mid-air by the tornado's wind."

What to Do?

When the tornado sirens sound, *do not* go to windows to see what is

Two HGMD Directors sworn in; one more appointed and sworn

At its monthly meeting on May 24, the HGMD Board of Directors seated three directors for terms of office that begin in May 2018. Bonnie McMullen and Sandra Rosenberg, who ran for the board unopposed, received four-year terms. As an appointee, Bill Archambault, was sworn in for a two-year term.

The three directors are incumbents, who were appointed to the board in August 2017. Archambault will continue as Treasurer, and will chair the Property Policy Committee. McMullen will continue as head of the HGMD Foundation, and Rosenberg will continue to chair the Clubhouse/Restaurant Committee.

Craig Baldwin and Gary Hizer make up the balance of the board, with terms of office lasting through May 2020. Hizer came to the board last August, following a

recall election, and chairs the Golf Committee.

Baldwin and Hizer then appointed McMullen, Rosenberg and Archambault to the board, bringing its number back to five directors. Archambault was unable to run for a seat in May 2018, due to being term limited from his earlier service on the HGMD Board. He was eligible, however, to be appointed for a two-year term.

Officers for the coming term were elected at the May 24 meeting.

An insert to this newsmagazine will have a report about additional items covered by the HGMD Board. Unfortunately, the meeting occurred too late in the month for *Heather 'n Yon* to cover. Copy for this issue had to be delivered to the printer on May 24, to get it back for delivery to residents by June 1.

10 ways to help your community thrive

1. Rules are Made to Be Broken. Don't just be an enforcer of rules. Always be asking, why do we have this rule? Does it add value to our community? Is it time to change this rule? Be willing to have a conversation about this, and be open minded about changing the rule. Change is the only way to stay relevant.

2. Get the Facts. Don't make assumptions about what you think you saw or heard. Get the facts by asking the people involved and listening without judgment or pretense. Create an environment where people feel safe to communicate, because they know they will be listened to and heard.

3. Everybody Matters. Don't show favoritism to long timers or the person with the loudest voice. Treat everyone the same and as you would want to be treated.

4. Create a Community that Supports Higher Goals. "Community" is defined as a feeling of fellowship with others. A community is one that shares common attitudes, interests and goals about living to-

gether. Discuss what goals, interests and attitudes the community wants to support. Create a vision among the members of what they want the building/area to be like for themselves and others.

5. Don't Gossip. Just don't! This is one of the biggest culprits of creating division within communities. When others start gossiping, shut them down! Make it clear that your community does not tolerate gossiping about others.

6. Have More Fun. Have more fun at meetings. It doesn't all have to be business. If you have a good "joke teller," have that person inject a joke in the proceedings. Share a visual comic with the members; tell a silly story about the community.

7. Communicate. Use all the means available to get information to the community: email, postings and have floor reps distribute, door-to-door, important information.

8. Keep your Bylaws Up-to-date and Distribute to New Members. Making sure everyone knows what is expected of them and what

to expect in return is a sure way to create a viable, trustworthy community. Be open to listening to needs to change these documents, to keep them relevant.

9. Don't Let Power Go to Your Head. Don't turn into a "Condo Commando." And don't accept that behavior from anyone else. There are always individuals that think their sole responsibility is to catch residents doing something wrong. These individuals actually poison the environment from the inside to the outside. Stop this behavior. Ask them to communicate to you whatever problem they see and then you address the issue!

10. It Is Not About You! It Is About the Whole Community! Do not let your personal feelings dictate the decisions made. What you want may not be what is best. Ask for input from the community.

HG draft Smoking Policy, as revised

Supersedes Prior Policy. This policy supersedes in its entirety any other smoking policy previously adopted by the board.

WHEREAS, the Declaration contains covenants and restrictions that bind the property subject to the Declaration and the Owners of such property; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors (the "Board") of the Heather Gardens Association, Inc. (the "Association") is empowered to make reasonable rules and regulations appropriate for the use of the Condominium Units and the Common Elements in the community; and

WHEREAS, Section 4.9. of the Declaration states that the, "Use of the Common Elements, including specifically the Limited Common Elements, is subject to Rules adopted by the Board;" and

WHEREAS, Section 1.32. of the Declaration defines Rules to mean, "rules, regulations, procedures, procedure memoranda, policies and guidelines adopted by the Board;" and

WHEREAS, Section 8.10. of the Declaration defines a Nuisance. "No unreasonably noxious or offensive activity is permitted within the Community. No use, activity or practice is permitted which may unreasonably interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of this property.

No activity may be conducted within the Community which is or might be unsafe or hazardous to any person or property. No portion of the Property may be used for the manufacturing or dispensing of any Schedule 1 controlled substance as that term is defined in the federal Controlled Substances Act. No odors may be emitted from any portion of the Community that would be reasonably offensive to others. All valid laws, ordinances and regulations of all governmental bodies having jurisdiction over the Community must be observed;" and

WHEREAS, while it is recognized that the Colorado Marijuana Legalization Amendment, also known as Amendment 64, was approved on November 6, 2012 and made the possession and use of marijuana legal under Colorado state law, it

should be noted that none of the permitted uses under state law alters the status of marijuana and its constituent compounds as illicit drugs under Schedule 1 of the federal Controlled Substances Act.; and

WHEREAS, the American Lung Association reports that, "Smoking marijuana clearly damages the human lung, and regular use leads to chronic bronchitis and can cause an immune-compromised person to be more susceptible to lung infections. No one should be exposed to second-hand marijuana smoke. Due to the risks it poses to lung health, the American Lung Association strongly cautions the public against smoking marijuana as well as tobacco products;" and

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service has concluded that, "There is no safe amount of second-hand smoke. Breathing even a little second-hand smoke can be dangerous." And that, "Separate 'no smoking' sections DO NOT protect [others] from second-hand smoke. Neither does filtering the air or opening a window;" and

WHEREAS, second-hand smoke from tobacco, marijuana, and similar combustible materials is a noxious and offensive activity, which may be determined by the Board a Nuisance and health hazard to Association Residents; and

WHEREAS, the Colorado General Assembly enacted the Colorado Clean Indoor Air Act, C.R.S. 25-14-101 et seq., effective July 1, 2006, which applies to condominium associations such as Heather Gardens Association, and seeks to limit exposure to tobacco smoke by regulating where people may use tobacco products; and

WHEREAS, on the 10th day of February, 2015, the Board enacted a Smoking Policy that, "requires that, in the event of a sale, conveyance, transfer, lease or renewal of lease of a Unit, the purchaser, transferee or lessee must provide the Association, prior to or at the closing of such sale, conveyance of transfer, or prior to or at the time of the execution of a lease an affidavit confirming their acceptance that the smoking of tobacco products, or e-cigarettes, or the use,

manufacturing or dispensing of any substance classified as a Schedule 1 controlled substance, as that term is defined in the federal Controlled Substances Act, is prohibited on any portion of the Association's property, within Units, or on limited common elements appurtenant to the Units, including lanais, and patios, or other common areas of the Association;" and

WHEREAS, the Board, on behalf of the Association intends to apply the Colorado Clean Air Act, by enacting reasonable Rules for the betterment of the community, to decrease the risk of fire, to minimize the adverse health impacts of second-hand smoke, and to avoid contamination of the Common Elements, these actions are necessary for the operation and maintenance of the Association; and

WHEREAS, the Board reserves its rights of assessment and fines per Section 6.1 of the Declaration.

NOW THEREFORE, the Association, by and through its Board of Directors, hereby adopts the following:

1. Definitions. For the purpose of these rules:

a. "Smoking" shall mean the carrying, burning, or otherwise handling or controlling a lit or smoldering product containing tobacco or marijuana, including a lighted cigarette, electronic cigarette, vaporizer, cigar, pipe, hookah, bong, or any other matter or substance that contains any amount of tobacco, marijuana, hash, wax, shatter, oils, or any similar cannabis concentrate.

b. "Resident" shall mean anyone who occupies a Unit as an Owner, Tenant or Guest as defined by Sections 1.20 and 1.28 of the Declaration.

2. Smoking Rules: Residents, Owners, Tenants, and Guest of a Unit purchased after February 10, 2015 may not smoke anywhere on Association property or within their individual Units. Residents of a Unit purchased before February 10, 2015, may only smoke inside their individual Unit(s) or on their lanais or patios, but only if such activity is not reported as being a nuisance by one

HGA Board President Reports

I would like to explain the HGA Board's position regarding a discussion that occurred at the April 17 HGA Board meeting. A small group of the Heather Gardens residents believe that HG can save money by changing from an internal property-management system to contracting with a professional property management company. This group asked the board to appoint an ad hoc committee to research this possibility.

The board explained to the residents voicing this request that the 2018 HGA Board has discussed this matter thoroughly. It was not in favor of pursuing this idea. The current model works well, and is beneficial to the membership (all residents). The board then invited the group to do the research. They could submit a plan, with costs, to HGA Board for further discussion.

HGA is an in-house incorporated non-profit property management company. It is run by an elected Board of

Directors, a general manager, a controller, a clubhouse manager, a contracts manager, a golf manager, maintenance and custodial supervisors, roads and grounds manager, a security chief, and a restaurant manager.

As an entity, it has clients, including 2,426 home owners, the Heather Gardens Metropolitan District (HGMD) and the Seville Recreation Association (SRA). Since HGA has management agreements with the HGMD and the SRA, the scope of services would list those functions and services for the potential management company as well.

The HGA corporation employs about 60 full-time and 50 seasonal workers. It has an annual budget of about \$11 million dollars.

It is the board's consensus opinion that owners would have to pay even higher membership fees to use a private, for-profit, property management company. This also might result in reduced services provided to the membership. That does not seem like sound financial policy for residents.

This group cannot expect any assistance from current HG staff, because these employees are important to all in the HGA corporation. Their job responsibility is to carry out what is approved by the board.

If this splinter group needs documents not readily available on the *heathergardens.org* website, they must request them through the General Manager. Documents will be provided within a reasonable period of time.



HGMD Board President Reports

In my article in the May issue of *Heather 'n Yon*, I mentioned a number of items that the four HGMD committees are working on. Today's column will describe a number of projects worth discussing in this forum.

The Property Policy Committee (PPC) is working with the Land Title Guarantee Company as that firm maps out HGMD boundaries and determines property lines between the HGA condominium complex and the buildings that belong to HGMD.

The Garden Club has requested a porta-potty be installed near the garden plots. The PPC is awaiting cost estimates before approving the installation.

After a discussion of drones flying in HG by the Golf Committee, the PPC is studying what policies might be needed.

Golf Committee members are studying a draft job description for the Golf Pro/Manager. Suggestions will go to the Golf Staffing Committee at their meeting on June 5.

Recently the HGMD Board approved Foundation funds to purchase "water-wise" landscaping materials to be planted along South Heather Gardens Way, south of the Maintenance Building. If this proves to be successful, the committee may consider transforming an area north of the same building and along the grassy area between Linvale Place and Yale Avenue. These are all grounds that are administered by HGMD.

The Foundation Committee members are pre-selling hooded sweatshirts in a number of colors, with great success. Delivery is scheduled for sometime in June.

The Clubhouse/Restaurant Committee is considering using lottery funds to pay for new outdoor pool furniture and three new equipment items for the fitness room.

Under consideration at the May 24 board meeting:

1. A community-wide smoking policy to mirror the police approved by the HGA Board (see page 10).
2. The HGMD Board will refer to the PPC the planning, in conjunction with the City of Aurora, to install a crosswalk from the Clubhouse to the Maintenance Building. A meeting is being planned with the City of Aurora.
3. A draft of HGMD's management agreement with HGA Board will be discussed. I expect the draft will be accepted by the board. HGA Board will have to

The pleasure and pain of owning a sailboat

As summer approaches, and more folks engage in outdoor activities, I am reminded of one activity I once enthusiastically enjoyed.

When I was stationed at Edgewood Arsenal, north of Baltimore with the Chesapeake Bay forming one of its boundaries, I bought a sailboat. It was a 27-foot, drop keel boat that had a small cabin. It had been well-maintained by the Army lieutenant colonel who sold it to me. He had docked it at the army base, but was looking to purchase a larger boat.

When I look back on this foray into being a boat owner, I chalk it up to youth and ignorance.

Don't get me wrong, sailing the Chesapeake Bay was glorious. There were lots of interesting things to see. You were never out of sight of land. (I did not venture too far south where the Chesapeake Bay emptied into the Atlantic Ocean.)

With the drop keel, I was somewhat protected if I navigated the boat into a shallow sandbar. You just lifted the keel, then you were no longer stuck. It meant you did not have to wait for the tide to rise to escape a shallow area. My boat did have a small outboard motor that helped when there was no wind, or when steering the boat into a dock safely.

It was fun to sail across the bay, docking at a favorite restaurant for a crab feast. Beer and a dozen crabs that you had to shell while getting your fingers messy with old bay seasoning was a leisurely summer dinner. You just had to be sure that you enjoyed the conversation with your companions — eating crabs that way is not “fast food.”

It was also pretty incredible to anchor somewhere in the bay, then fall asleep within a rocking boat.

While I could manage the boat single-handed, it was simpler to have a second pair of hands. Thus, I usually sailed with a crew.

These are the youthful “golden” memories. There are some that show my ignorance.

What made me think that learning to sail in a one-person Sailfish on a lake in Wisconsin as a teenager would qualify me to be a captain of a boat three times as large?

Soon after purchasing the boat, I invited two friends to join me for an afternoon cruise. One was an experience sailor. He quickly, and emphatically, taught me how to warn my passengers when I was going to make a turn to catch the wind on the other side of the boat, known as “coming about.”

During this maneuver, the captain typically pushes the tiller (as I had) away, the sail flutters as the boat changes direction and the boom swings across to the other side of the boat. Woe to all passengers, if they are not properly forewarned — they could be hit by the boom. Worse yet, they could be swept into the water.

Fortunately, I did not lose any passengers that way.

One fellow sailor once described sailing to be 95 percent boredom as you tried to find the best course in which to catch the best wind to move the boat the fastest; then 5 percent terror. The latter occurred when a severe storm developed while sail-

ing. Strong winds, rain and lightning are not the conditions you want for a pleasant cruise. I had a few of those moments.

Because the Chesapeake Bay, at its northernmost points, could freeze over in the winter, I had to take the boat out of the water in the fall. It could be stored on its trailer near the dock on the army base, but the sails and other soft goods had to be stored in the cabin, or at home.

I did not have a truck that could haul the boat out of the water, but I don't recall having difficulty getting an assist from the fellow boat owners, who were either retired or active duty military. Most had power boats. They liked fishing the bay. One had a lobster boat. He invited me to ride along once while he checked his traps, done early in the morning. (Think sun rising time.)

After learning the hard work to collect lobsters in the bay, the lobsterman gave me two for my next meal. I thought I would invite a friend to go sailing, then boil the live lobsters for a meal. What I had not anticipated was that the galley stove would not heat a large pot of water to boiling.

We had eaten our salads, drunk a lot of beer, but still the water was too lukewarm to cook a live lobster. There was nothing to be done — the lobsters were taken home, then cooked there. Not quite the holiday dinner that was planned while anchored, and watching the sun set.

I sold the boat when I left active duty, and my next job was pending. I always chuckle when I remember some of the funny things that happened during those ownership years. I learned a lot, even took a navigating class. But I never bought another boat.

I haven't even tried to rent a sailboat at the Cherry Creek Reservoir — the lake just seems too small and too tame.

Dancer faces life's difficulties courageously, with energy

Rain pelted 14-year-old Franca Telesio, B209, as she stood, staring through the window at the empty dance floor. She'd been inexplicably drawn to the dance studio since her first friend in Venezuela invited her to walk with her to her dance lesson. What's ballet? Franca had wondered as the two walked. Franca often returned to watch lessons through the window. Today, she was alone in the deluge. The instructor beckoned Franca to come inside.

"Come on. I'll give you a class."

She longed to dance, but her mother couldn't afford lessons. The two had recently located to Venezuela from Europe. Franca was born near the end of WW2 to a single Italian woman, who had escaped a German Prisoner

of War camp. Franca lived an unsettled life in Catholic orphanages in Switzerland and Italy before reuniting with her mother, around age 13, then moving to Venezuela.

"I'll teach you for free," the instructor assured her. Franca was a quick and eager student.

Not long into her lessons, acclaimed London Festival Ballet dancer and choreographer Anton Dolin visited Caracas and saw promise in Franca's ability. He urged her to enroll in Arts Educational Trust, an elite British school that combined general academic education with specialized training in all arts.

Franca thrived in her curriculum as she progressed through all of the Arts Educa-

tional Trust's three campuses. She studied and danced in a centuries-old manor house at Tring Park. She continued at the London Theater School. Then she finished formal schooling at the Trust's Teaching College.

As Franca was completing her work, Martha Graham Dance Company formed a branch in London. Graham's visceral, intense, gorgeous sinuous, passionate style had enormous appeal for Franca.

"When I saw Graham, I thought, 'Oh, that's me.'"

Central to the Graham technique is a movement called Contraction/Release.

Franca demonstrates "Contraction." She tightens her pelvic and abdominal muscles as she exhales elongating her spine into a concave arc from coccyx to occiput.

"Release." Her body bursts outward, straightening as she inhales.

She danced with the London Contemporary Dance Theater until she broke her back.

"I was about 27. My partner didn't catch me as I was jumping and I fell backwards. I hurt so badly I couldn't dance for 11 years."

Surgery was not an option she was willing to try.

"I had seen a dancer who had been operated on. She couldn't move her back anymore."

Franca embarked on a quest for remediation. She returned first to her mother's care in Venezuela, then traveled to Boston for macrobiotics healing. Then she tried

Jemez Bodhi Mandala Zen Center in New Mexico. She met her husband Erland at the Zen center.

Erland had a slow-growing brain tumor. He underwent two unsuccessful surgeries that left him incapacitated. He could no longer talk or eat. Not wanting to place him in a nursing facility, Franca cared for him herself.

"The reason why I was able to do that is because I had already known what it was like when you cannot do what you

National Parks are favorite excursions for summer: Colorado has four parks

With the summer travel season here, many residents may be planning a trip to one or more of the National Parks throughout the country. In Colorado, we are fortunate to have four of the best. Within the next few issues of *Heather 'n Yon*, I will be taking a look at some facts and history about the national parks in our state.

Depending on the interest and feedback, I might consider looking into the National Parks in neighboring states, Utah and Wyoming.

The United States has 59 National Parks in 28 states. National Parks are not to be confused with National Monuments, of which Colorado has eight.

Colorado's four National Parks (CNPs) are special to most people who live in the state.. Mesa Verde, unlike the parks established to preserve the works of nature, was established to preserve the works of man.

Mesa Verde became a National Park in June 1906.


Of the four Colorado parks, three are located in the southern half of the state. Mesa Verde is one of these. Deep in the southwestern corner of Colorado, known as the Four Corners area, you will find this park.

Mesa Verde is from the Spanish meaning "green table." Sitting at an average elevation of 7,300 feet, it provided protection from early invaders for the people who inhabited the cliff dwellings. Apparently, the location worked. During the time it was inhabited, there were more people in the present four corners area than there are today.

For several years, the people living in the area were referred to as "anasazi." Archeological data and studies have determined these people were the early ancestors of today's pueblo residents who mainly live in New Mexico.

There are 19 pueblo communities within that state, each with its

The Month (May)

Pardon our dust, er-r-r-r, dead grass: the grass on the median on South Heather Gardens Way is being allowed to die. It will be replaced with drought-tolerant plantings. Members of the Budget & Finance (B&F) Committee expressed concern that the dying grass might signal to HG residents that the community is running out of money.

...

B&F discussed, but did not act upon, a motion to add a Security Officer to HG's department, to provide security for events in the Clubhouse. The position was not budgeted, and it was noted that HGMD, which owns the Clubhouse, had not been formally brought into the discussion.

General Manager Calvin White explained that HGA's attorney felt — with the spate of shootings in public places, of late — HGA had exposure to liability. Because HG has a Security Department, which is located in the Clubhouse, HG has some responsibility to provide security for Clubhouse activities.

"It's worse to do something poorly, than to not do it at all," he said.

In addition, White said, Colorado homeowners association (HOA) law has changed, making it harder for HOAs to take a "we don't cover that" approach to certain issues. B&F felt more information, including an estimate of cost, was called for, and returned the action to the

SEC for additional study.

Discussed at the Clubhouse/Restaurant Committee Meeting was the option of raising the cost of Clubhouse-room rentals, to help defray the additional expense of a security officer. The goal would be to have two security officers on duty, when Clubhouse usage is high.

...

Insurance Subcommittee Chair Susan Lambert reported that HG might need to change its coverage, to include business-interruption coverage, when its policy renews. In summary, if the Clubhouse experienced a fire or other disruption, the community would have to pay rent on obtaining alternate space for all the entities that had offices within the Clubhouse. HG also would experience a loss of income from rooms unable to be rented in the Clubhouse.

HG's insurance broker recommended increasing liability coverage to \$2 million, from its current \$1 million. The hurricanes and other severe weather that the insurance industry covered in other parts of the country last year could result in higher insurance premiums across the nation.

...

The Ad Hoc Committee on Golf Shop Staffing circulated the draft of a job description for the HG Golf Pro, who will be a full-time HG employee. Several members of the HG Men's Golf League objected to the plan to

interview outside candidates for the position, stating they felt the job should be offered to HG's contract golf pro, Robert Macaluso, first.

Men's Club President George Brown stated, "Some of us feel it's a gross insult to Bob to have him apply, and interview with other candidates. We feel he should be offered the job."

Committee Chair Kathy Burhman responded, "We can't do that. It has to be open. A lot of people [residents] are watching this process."

General Manager Calvin White explained that the job description is still in draft form. When it's final, Macaluso "might not want what we have to offer," White said. He agreed to set an informal meeting with Macaluso, to exchange information on terms and needs of the golf course. The meeting occurred on Wednesday, May 16.

Golf Committee Chair Gary Hizer stated, "I also think Bob should be given first right of refusal" for the job. A copy of the draft golf-pro-job description was distributed to the Golf Committee, which met later the same day.

...

After a review of his job performance from General Manager Calvin White, delivered via email, Restaurant Manager Kevin Olson resigned, effective at the end of May. Olson had been widely congratulated by residents on various board committees for requiring less of a subsidy for the restaurant this year than was anticipated when the 2018 budget was formulated last fall.

According to Clubhouse/Restaurant Committee minutes, Olson had hired his nephew Sean Olson as assistant manager. Unfortunately, events quickly spiraled out of control while White was on vacation. Kevin Olson was escorted from the restaurant premises by HG Security, and the restaurant posted a sign that it was closed on April 23. As *Heather 'n Yon* went to the printer, there was no indication when the restaurant would re-open, and under whose management.

...

The Clubhouse/Restaurant Committee recommended that 14 patio chaise-lounge chairs, 24 straight-back chairs, and two umbrellas be purchased from Lottery Funds for a total cost not to exceed \$5,000. These would replace chairs around the outdoor swimming pool. The umbrellas would be added to those already in use by the restaurant on its patio.

Trip to Rocky Mountain Arsenal Wildlife



On May 4, HG residents took a Clubhouse-sponsored trip to Rocky Mountain Arsenal Wildlife Reserve, National Eagle Repository and National Wildlife Property Repository. Two HG photographers had different experiences, different photographs of what can be seen at this unique location.

At Rocky Mountain Arsenal, National Wildlife Property Repository, the public tours are free, but only available on the first Friday of the month with advance reservations.

For legal reasons, the HG visitors could only take photos in the main welcome-center room. The artifacts here had long ago been adjudicated in the courts. All the rest of the specimens in the main warehouse can't be photographed for legal reasons.

The National Eagle Repository (NER) was neat as well. All protected eagles (mostly American Bald Eagles) that are killed by whatever causes are first sent to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) in Oregon where an "autopsy" is performed to determine cause of death. Forensic data is gathered for possible legal evidence.

Then the eagle is frozen and sent to the NER. Here they are processed. That involves a detailed analysis of their feathers and other body parts. The bird is inventoried and stored.


The U.S. government has an agreement with all Native American tribes that consider the eagle to be sacred (250+). The tribes may access feathers and parts. Visitors were not allowed to take photographs of the processing!

Any Native American, group or tribe, if they are from an officially recognized group, can request eagle parts (claws), or feathers for official head dresses, dance costumes, etc. They can only have one request active at a time. Otherwise, there is no limit and No Charge!

The main specimen repository (warehouse) started in 1998 when the Arsenal NWR opened, with an initial shipment of about 130,000 items from several USFWS locations. Today over 1.8 million specimens are in storage! We saw two complete, stuffed Bengal tigers, several whole, stuffed

black panthers, and a huge diversity of wildlife in the welcome center.

used to do. Because I had broken my back, that nurtured my compassion.”

The two moved to Montrose to be near his parents. She taught dance and performed at venues in western Colorado: Crested Butte, Glenwood Springs, Aspen, and Telluride.

They moved to Denver, where she taught Graham techniques at Cleo Parker Robinson's New Dance Theater. She cared for Erland 11 years before he needed to be in a nursing home.

Her back remained painful until she sought chiropractic treatment at Maximize Living, at age 69. Now, at age 73, she credits years of dance discipline, yoga and zen training, and a blood type O diet for her exuberant energy.

“I just eat to have energy and that I have plenty of. I do not, absolutely not, eat any junk.”

Franca evinces energy. Her posture is erect, at ease, balanced. One moment she sits still in a chair. The next moment she is on the floor with legs extending in a Russian split with head and torso flat against the carpet

as she demonstrates her flexibility. Her speech itself dances, it moves through variances of pitch and tempo as her body extends the thoughts through graceful, fluid motion.

The energy was not easily or quickly attained. It took years to master. She despairs that people give up too quickly. She learned from the best, and desires to teach dancers, adults, seniors. To that end, she keeps her HG apartment of two years spare of furniture with a ballet barre in her dining room.

“Unless I teach, I don't enjoy life that much. I do, but that's my passion. Do you have to be young? Nooooo,” she emphasizes.

“But you see, people have to live longer to know more deeply inside

approve in June after their review of the document. (Results of these discussions will be included on a flyer provided in this newsmagazine, as will the applicant selected to be appointed to the board, bringing its membership to five.)

One final note: HGMD's four committees have a full complement of members, eight on each one. However, each committee chairs continue to collect applications. Thus, they can be prepared whenever an opening occurs.

own governing body. Today's pueblo people have asked that the term “ana-sazi” no longer be used, due to an inference that is unflattering to today's people.

The park is best known for the cliff houses, but these structures developed late in the history of the people. The earliest data on Mesa Verde residents goes back to around 600 A.D. At that time, they were living in pit houses with a type of thatched roof cover. The mesa provided all they needed for survival. They were hunter/gathers, engineers and architects. They were able to find everything they needed to survive on the mesa.

Around 750 to 900 A.D., a new style of architecture was developed. Stone structures began to appear on top the ground rather than below it. The stone that was used was native sandstone, found all over the mesa. Tools made of harder stone, found

away from the mesa, were used to shape and sculpt blocks that formed the new building types.

The villages grew in size and design, accommodating several families in some cases. Beginning around 1150 A.D., these same types of buildings began to be constructed inside the naturally occurring sandstone caves throughout many of the canyon walls.

The locations of these caves provided protection from the elements and any intruders as well as being “climate controlled.” The openings faced west, in most cases, providing sunlight and warmth in the winter, shade on hot summer days and protection from winter storms.

These same types of structures developed all over this part of the Four Corners area. By 1300, the mesa and the entire area had been abandoned. Speculation abounds as to why the indigenous people left — it is one of the mysteries of the American Southwest.





or more Residents, are subject to the provisions of Section 3 below,

Visitors and Guests are not members of the Association and as such, have no membership rights, vested or otherwise, and therefore may not smoke anywhere on Association property, whether common or private.

Rental Agreements must include a statement that the rental party understands that this is a non-smoking facility.

3. Littering Rules: Littering of tobacco and/or smoking product debris, including but not limited to cigarette butts, product packaging, and matches, on Association property is strictly prohibited and may subject an Owner to a fine per Association Policy Legal 3, Rev "A". Owners shall also be held responsible for any fine incurred due to a violation by their agent, employee, tenant, visitor, licensee or invitee of the Owner, or the employee, invitee or licensee of their tenant.

4. Enforcement: The Association's enforcement of these rules shall be conducted in accordance

with the Association's Rules and Regulations, Bylaws and Enforcement Policies.

a. The General Manager is authorized by this resolution to summarize judge littering violations. Appeals will be heard by the Board in executive session.

b. If one or more neighboring Residents or Owners complain of second-hand smoke emanating from another's Unit, the Board of Directors, in its sole discretion, but only after providing notice and opportunity for hearing, may require the Owner of the Unit from which the odor of smoke emanates to abate such second-hand smoke.

The Owner of the emanating Unit shall have a two-week time period to implement corrective action and shall bear the cost and expense of such measures in their entirety. In addition, fines per Association Policy Legal 3, Rev "A".

c. After the correction period, should the General Manager receive a complaint that smoke odor or second-hand smoke continues to emanate from the Unit, the Board of Directors may, following an additional notice and the opportunity for

a hearing, take further action, up to and including an assessment of fines per Association Policy Legal 3, Rev "A". Such infractions shall be verified by the General Manager or his designee using their own senses and verified by equipment designed to detect second-hand smoke.

The Board or its agent may deviate from the procedures set forth in this policy if in its sole discretion such deviation is reasonable under the circumstances.

The undersigned hereby certify that foregoing Resolution was adopted in accordance with the Heather Gardens Association's Bylaws, Procedures, and Policies.

{Editor's Note: After the HGA Board approved this policy on May 15, the HGA lawyer made additional changes. It may need to be approved again.

There were two attachments to the policy that are too detailed to reproduce here. One attachment lists the fines that would be levied on residents not complying with the policy.

The second attachment outlines the steps to be taken by HG Management, and HG Security specifically, when a resident is reported to be violating the smoking policy.

Amateur Radio Technician
License Class

For those who have an interest in amateur (ham) radio, and those that have previously held a license that

they may want to reinstate, a group of residents are collecting the names of those who are interested taking a class to prepare for the FCC Technician license examination.

Current or previously licensed hams who moved into HG, but could not operate due to antenna restrictions imposed by the HGA, can get back on the air. A repeater has been installed in HG, operating on 447.925 receive with 100 Hz tone, and 442.925 transmit. It is owned, controlled and monitored by the RADOPS of the El Jebel Shriners organization of Denver. The call sign is K0FEZ. It is open to all FCC-licensed amateur radio operators. It is reachable by low power handheld amateur radios, without external antennas..

The repeater is intended for general use and as an emergency communications tool for HG Emergency Communications Committee, in a situation where normal communications are disrupted.

The class takes about 16 hours of class time. The actual schedule will be determined based on the number who sign up and what times are available at the Clubhouse.

Classroom instruction is free. There will be a study book required, costing less than \$25. The FCC test may be free of charge.



are usually sorted as Promotions, but contain important announcements, schedules, programs, etc, for the HG community.

The Social and Promotions mailboxes are tagged or labeled accordingly.

b) If you are reading your Gmail using, say the iPhone Apple app that comes with your smart phone, all your emails appear on one page in the Inbox. In other words, they are all in one folder or batch, listed chronologically.

You should see HG bulletins in this main folder or page.

c) If, however, you are reading your Gmail on a PC or laptop, then Gmail shows three different folders

at the top of the window listing your emails: Primary, Social and Promotions. (The default page is Primary.) If you don't check your Promotions folder for important messages, you can easily miss the HG e-blasts with all the important information about HG.

By the way, you must register your email with Lewis Boeve, Assistant Clubhouse Manager, in the Clubhouse office, if you want to receive HG email notices.

Hope this helps with HG communications — discover those missing emails!





They were armed with both 50-caliber machine guns, and a 30 mm cannon, both mounted in the nose. It was a deadly combination.

Due to the mid-mounted engine, they had a somewhat "different" feel, or handling characteristics, and were not popular with American pilots. The biggest problem was a lack of a super charger, which limited the high altitude performance, a critical need for bomber escort in Europe.

America's worst WW2 fighter was the star of the Russian Air Force. The Russians loved the plane for CAS (close air support) against the Germans. So, most of the Bell Air Cobras were given to the Russians in the Lend-Lease program. Not many of the Bell Air Cobras exist in the U.S.

This year's Oshkosh Air Show hosted three flying Bell Air Cobras, one P-39 and two P-63 King Cobras! It was a unique and historic event.



happening, because flying glass and debris are the #1 danger to people in a severe storm. Turn on your Weather Radio or TV. Take shelter.


For multi-story buildings, go to an inner hall in your unit, or better yet, an inner hallway in the building. For Country Place units, go to the basement, or an inner hallway or bathroom where there are no windows (if no basement).

For Town Homes, go to the basement, preferably to a corner. Take shelter under a heavy object, like a pool table or maybe other furniture, to protect you if the floor above were to collapse.

Take your smart phone and/or a weather radio with you. Another option is to turn the volume up on your TV so you can follow what is going on.

This map shows, over the years, that there have been quite a number of tornados around the Denver area, including Aurora. A couple have been only a few miles from HG.

Most TV stations in the Denver area offer free weather apps for your smart phone. If you haven't already downloaded one, we suggest you do so. Those apps are free and can give you near real time radar images,

weather reports and alerts.

You can sign up for weather alerts and warnings to be sent automatically to your smart phone. This is an excellent way to get notified when severe weather and warnings of thunderstorms or tornados are in the area, even when you are asleep at night.

Be prepared, get a weather app for your smart phone and/or a weather radio that is portable. It can be used in your shelter area. Have a plan about where to go for shelter. Take your smart phone or weather radio with you. Lastly, watch your TV weather forecasts. They are good for early warnings about upcoming severe weather possibilities. Plan ahead and stay safe!




